Our Mission

The mission of the Trustee of the Geelong Advertiser Music Scholarship Trust is to present an annual project - Australian Youth Classical Music Competition. The Competition is divided into two parts – the Regional and the National Competitions.

Regional Competition

The objective of the Regional Competition is to encourage and recognize local solo instrumental musicians. To enter the Regional Section, participants must be aged 18 years of age or younger as at the start of the year and reside within the G21 footprint, are a full-time student at a secondary school within the region or study with a music teacher in the region. This year the age limit was raised to 19 to compensate for the cancellation of the 2020 competition due to the developing COVID-19 pandemic.

There were 24 Regional applications this year. The finalists are selected through a process of an audition before a panel of expert musicians to choose up to twelve finalists to perform at the Regional Finals Concert before an audience where first prize and three runner-up prizes are awarded. However, the June Finals Concert could not be held as usual due to public health restrictions and a maximum occupancy number of 10 people in the venue. Each finalist arrived separately and then performed before two adjudicators.

The financial rewards available for the Regional competition are the \$2,000 Geelong Chamber Music Society Helen Jordan First Prize and three Runner-Up Prizes of \$1,000. The winner is invited to perform at the National Finals Concert.

National Competition

The purpose of the National Competition is to encourage young people to aspire to excellence in classical music and to further the musical education of the recipients. To enter the National Section, participants must be solo classical musicians aged between 16 and 25 years by the closing date of applications and an Australian citizen or a permanent resident of Australia. The maximum age limit was raised to 26 this year to compensate for the cancellation of the 2020 competition.

This year there was a record number of 44 National applications. The finalists are selected through a process of submitting a video performance with set performance requirements. A Selection Panel of high-profile expert musicians will choose a maximum of eight finalists to compete at the July National Finals Weekend.

The National Finals includes two superb concerts – the Saturday concert featuring repertoire from the baroque and Classical periods while the Sunday concert features repertoire from the Romantic and Modern periods. Unfortunately, the usual planned concerts were not able to be presented due to the COVID-19 restrictions, a maximum occupancy number of 10 people in the venue and state border closures. The eight finalists performed via pre-recorded videos to an audience of three adjudicators and seven Board members on the Sunday.

The financial rewards available for the National competition are the \$10,000 Overseas Travel Scholarship sponsored by the Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust, \$3,000 Second Prize and a \$2,000 Third Prize. The winner is also offered the opportunity to perform with the Geelong Symphony Orchestra.

Our Goals

The goals of The Australian Youth Classical Music Competition are –

- Encourage young people to aspire to excellence in music and to further the musical education of the recipients of the prizes
- Provide opportunities for young musicians of potentially international calibre to perform before an audience
- Enrich the community by providing opportunities to hear young talented musicians perform in high class concert venues
- Increase the skill of the performing arts communities in Victoria
- Increase the public profiles of the musicians, and sponsoring organizations contributing to the program

Areas of the Community Served by the Competition

Aspiring Musicians

The ultimate objective of the Competition is to provide financial assistance to further the careers and studies of the winners and the opportunity given to perform on the concert hall stage with their peers. In this way, the scholarship serves those who, because of their youth, would otherwise have little opportunity to be heard in a high-class auditorium.

The Local, Regional and Metropolitan Communities

Secondly, the Australian Youth Classical Music Competition provides the opportunity for the Geelong and Melbourne communities to hear the best of young talented musicians, drawn from across Australia.

In addition, local schools and music teachers are given the opportunity to promote attendance and admission concessions are made to school and music students. Finally, the community of Geelong is encouraged to support the Competition by attending the Concerts and also by donating to the Public Trust Fund.

Our History

The Scholarship came about as a result of The Geelong Advertiser Pty Ltd marking the achievement of 150 years of publishing in November 1990. A special feature was produced containing 150 pages, each page recalling the major events in a particular year from 1840 through to 1990. Sales of the special feature produced a sizable profit. The Geelong Advertiser sought to widen its support of community programs in the field of performing arts, especially for the benefit of musicians by providing assistance to them to further their skills, talents and careers. To this end, the Geelong Advertiser Music Scholarship Trust was formed through an initial grant of \$60,000 made by The Geelong Advertiser.

Initially, the Scholarship competition was structured to offer a National prize only, however in 2005, the Trust implemented a Regional Section.

In 2011 the Trustees resolved to change the name of the Geelong Advertiser Music Competition to the **Australian Youth Classical Music Competition.**

Chair Report 2021

This year marks our 30th Anniversary, a significant milestone in the history of the Trust.

In that context and on behalf of the Trustees, I would firstly like to recognise the founders from the Geelong Advertiser who had the vision for both a national and a regional scholarship which would encourage young, classical music performers to achieve excellence in their craft.

As you may be aware, 2020 was to be our 30th anniversary year but as reported last year, the competition was unable to be held in any form due to COVID restrictions. We are very sad for the students who missed the opportunity to perform that year. As a consequence, in 2021 we raised the age limit by one year for both the Regional and National Competitions so no potential competitor from 2020 missed out due to age limit restrictions.

While we had hoped 2021 would be a more 'normal' year, that was not to be! However, I am pleased to report that both competitions were able to be held this year but in different forms to previous years.

The Regional Competition was held in May at the Keith Humble Centre at the Geelong College, but with no audience. While this was disappointing as the 10 finalists missed the opportunity to perform in front of an audience, they still had the chance to have their wonderful music heard by the two judges.

The Regional Competition is of particular importance as it encourages aspiring musicians in the Geelong region to achieve recognition, performance experience and encourage the further development of their musical careers.

Likewise, the National Competition had to 'pivot' as interstate travel was not possible for all contestants. Consequently, all performances by the eight finalists were submitted by video. The three judges met and viewed all performances together at the Keith Humble Centre in July. The high musical quality evident in these videos suggested that we would have had a fantastic 'in-person' concert, but this was not to be.

Congratulations to all the superb young musicians who participated in the 2021 Regional and National Competitions. We thank you and wish each of you every best wish for your future musical careers.

This is the first of four years of our Alliance with the Geelong College. While we were unable to have audiences for either Competition, Regional competitors or their accompanists were able to play the magnificent new Steinway & Sons grand piano, which is part of the benefits of the Alliance.

We have some marvellous, loyal sponsors many of whom have been with the Trust for years and we do thank them sincerely.

The Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust, through General Manager Warwick Ross, became a major sponsor in 2015. We greatly appreciate the partnership we have established with the Trust and for Warwick's personal enthusiasm for the scholarship.

We also appreciate other sponsors who have been with us, some for many years and particularly acknowledge support from: The Geelong Advertiser Group, City of Greater Geelong, Geelong Chamber Music Society, Ruth Fagg Foundation, Geelong Connected

There is a substantial cost to provide scholarships of this order and the Trustees pursue relevant sponsorship and grant opportunities.

This year, one of our Trustees David Fox assumed the role of Competition Co-ordinator as a volunteer. David has filled this role superbly, developing many aspects of the marketing, website, competitor and program co-ordination and the technology required to successfully hold the competitions this year. Also this year, Marian McDonald very capably assumed the role of Secretary of the Trust.

We were delighted to welcome two new Trustees in 2021. Following the resignation of Mark Kruger, Adam Boyce was appointed as Treasurer. We also welcomed Gary Jewson onto the Trust.

In addition to Adam and Gary, I would like to express my appreciation to my fellow Trustees – Wendy Galloway, Tom Healey, Peter Horan, Richard Anderson, Marian McDonald, David Fox and Scott Bennett who represents the Geelong Advertiser on the Trust.

We look forward to maintaining the high standard of this scholarship and presenting many more concerts of fine music in 2022 and beyond.

OUR INITIATIVES AND CHALLENGES

Alliance with The Geelong College

In previous years since 2016, a Steinway piano has been hired for use at the National Finals Weekend held at the Geelong College in the Keith Humble Performing Arts Centre. The fee of \$5,000 added a considerable but necessary cost to the competition each year and taking the event to new level of quality – accompanists and soloist loved playing this piano, and the audience appreciated the difference in performance.

The GAMST Board entered into an alliance with the Geelong College in 2020 to contribute \$4,500 plus GST each year for four years towards the purchase of a new state of the art Steinway piano. The alliance gives access to the new piano and also covers venue hire, audio-visual technical staff and associated services for both sections of the Competition for years 2021 – 2024 inclusive.

Challenges of COVID-19 Pandemic

In March 2020, the Board made the difficult decision of postponing the competition until the following year due to the developing COVID-19 Pandemic.

It was decided to go ahead with the competition in 2021 but as the year unfolded with ever changing rules and restrictions, limited venue capacities, lockdowns and state border closures, cancellation would have been the easier option.

The National section was especially difficult to manage – the Board decided that the only way to hold the competition was by all video performances from the finalists in front of a three-person Adjudication Panel and a small group of Trustees. A mix of live and video performances was not considered objective and fair to all involved. The valuable opportunity to perform live in front of an audience and to mix with their peers was not possible however the performance videos were available to view on the competition website.

The challenges of presenting the competition with the COVID-19 restrictions has taught the Board to be resourceful, flexible and resilient. Meetings of the Board were held via Zoom and any issues or last-minute changes dealt with as necessary. For example, the original Adjudicator for the Regional Finals was Ingrid Martin was unable to attend because Melbourne was in lockdown, she was replaced at the last minute by two Geelong music specialists. The Project Coordinator David Fox, communicated closely with the young musicians, they adapted to the changed conditions and the competition was successfully completed under difficult circumstances.

National Application Requirements

The National application video requirements in regards to repertoire needs to be made very clear and well defined – there was some confusion or different interpretations of what was required.

The minimum age limit of 16 years of age for the National applicants will be changed to 18 years of age – the winner is expected to travel overseas within two years and could be difficult for a very young winner. This has not been an issue in the past, but this year there were two exceptional 16-year-old finalists.
